The Preliminary SAT (PSAT) is a standardized test measuring the skills and knowledge gained from high school, as well as material necessary for success in college. ACT Corner

Illinois has officially purchased the SAT rather than the ACT to offer public school students as a measurement of college preparedness. This has left many parents and students wondering for which test to prepare: the ACT or the SAT? Luckily, we at iLearn Academy know a thing or two about

As of 2007, every four-year college accepts either ACT or SAT scores. These from a college admissions standpoint, are entirely interchangeable. Both tests assess your student's capability in mathematics, reading comprehension, grammar, vocabulary, punctuation and quantitative reasoning. So if they test the same concepts and subject matter, why study for one over the other?

In short, available study materials. The SAT recently went through a major formatting change earlier this year, meaning any prep materials written prior to 2016 are no longer relevant. We say study for the ACT, which has plenty of consistent material to choose from and prepares students for the concepts covered in the SAT as well.
